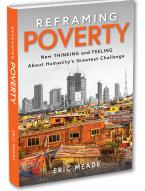
Reframing for Innovation:

This session will explore alternative explanations of poverty as a gateway to innovative interventions that participants can prototype and develop. Why are some people poor? What should we do about it? These questions have prompted many different answers for hundreds of years. This pre-conference will invite participants to find new insights and opportunities for their work by applying a variety of perspectives on poverty – even those they would rather avoid!
